Timothy Bogart Executive Producer, "Majors & Minors"

Coming to The Hub TV Network, Fall 2011

Tim started his career in children's television, overseeing such series as The Family Channel's, "Under African Skies," starring Robert Mitchum and "The Adventures of The Black Stallion," starring Mickey Rooney.

In 1997, he broke new ground in children's television by creating, writing, directing and executive producing a live-action version of the Kipling classic, "The Jungle Book" for Fox Kids Network shot entirely in the rainforest of Costa Rica.

Tim's television work also includes the Columbia/Tri-Star Series "Born Free," for which he wrote and directed nearly half the first season's 26 episodes. Additionally, he was the writer/executive producer of the two-hour event movie for ABC, "The Extreme Team," starring Bai Ling and Eric Mabius and he wrote and executive produced "Conspiracy," a one-hour dramatic pilot for Lifetime Television.

Tim has developed series for HBO, FX and Fox and is currently developing a new scripted series for ABC.

In the feature world, his first film as writer/producer was the children's adventure, "In Search of The Elephant Eye Diamond." Tim also produced "Love and Sex," which premiered at the 2000 Sundance Film Festival before being released by LionsGate. The film starred Famke Janssen and Jon Favreau.

His other feature credits include writing the Dimension Films release "The I Inside," for Executive Producers Bob and Harvey Weinstein, starring Ryan Phillipe, Sara Polley, Piper Perabo, Robert Sean Leonard and Stephen Rea.

Tim's first feature as writer/director was "Touched," starring Emmy Nominee and Golden Globe Winner, Jenna Elfman. Chosen as both the Prestigious Opening Night Film of the 2005 Boston Film Festival and the Premiere Screening at the 2005 Hollywood Film Festival, the film also starred Samantha Mathis; Golden Globe Nominee, Diane Venora; and Golden Globe Winner and Oscar Nominee, Bruce Davison. Tim has written and developed features for actors including Tom Cruise, and studios including Disney, Paramount and Sony.
